On Wednesday, April 2, Elford Construction workers broke down the wall located outside of the Plant Engineering office to make way for the tunnel that will connect the basement of the main facility to the basement of the new addition.

Breaking Down the Wall

On Wednesday, April 2, Elford construction workers used crowbars and spud bars to break down a cement block wall outside the Plant Engineering office, making way for a tunnel that will connect the basement of the main facility to the basement of

the new addition. The whole process took less than an hour. Later in the week, workers poured concrete to smooth out the elevations in the tunnel and secured plywood over the opening to keep the area secured until the tunnel is open for use early next year.

Once open, staff will have access to a second elevator that will go from the basement to the Patient Tower. This tunnel will lead to the basement of the new building, which will house mechanical equipment, as well as Central Processing.

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Project BRIGHT is a \$37.8 million facility expansion underway on FMC's main campus.
