### THE 24TH ANNUAL BRUCE E. SIEGEL MEMORIAL LECTURE

Bruce E. Siegel, MD, a beloved physician who was one of the first members of the Medical Staff at Mount Carmel East, believed that an individual's understanding of his or her health problems, as well as knowledge of what it takes to stay healthy, are critical factors in the healing process. The Bruce E. Siegel Center for Health Education, which opened in January 1994 in his honor, embodies these beliefs.

The Bruce E. Siegel Memorial Lecture recognizes Dr. Siegel's membership on the first Ethics Study Group, established at Mount Carmel East in 1985. The Ethics Study Groups at both Mount Carmel West and Mount Carmel East became Medical Staff committees in 1987 with representation from physicians and non-physicians. Today, these groups, along with the Ethics Committee at Mount Carmel St. Ann's, continue to have interdisciplinary representation.

Ethics initiatives, such as education, 24-hour consultation services, policy and position statement development, and community forums, have evolved from these Ethics Advisory Committees. Consistent with Mount Carmel's Mission, these committees are forums that serve as a resource to healthcare providers.

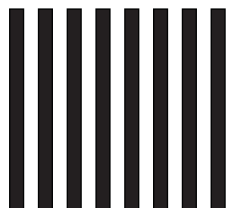

## THE SPEAKER

### Robert Lupton, PhD

Bob Lupton has invested the past 41 years of his life in inner-city Atlanta. In response to a call that he first felt while serving in Vietnam, he left a budding business career to work with delinquent urban youth. Bob and his family sold their suburban home and moved into the inner-city where they have lived and served as neighbors among those in need. His life's work has been the rebuilding of urban neighborhoods where families can flourish and children can grow into healthy adults.

Bob is a Christian community developer, an entrepreneur who brings together communities of resource with communities of need. Through FCS Urban Ministries — a non-profit organization which he founded — he has developed three mixed-income subdivisions, organized two multi-racial congregations, started a number of businesses, created housing for hundreds of families, and initiated a wide range of human services in his community. He is the author of five books: (*Theirs is the Kingdom; Return Flight; Renewing the City; Compassion, Justice and the Christian Life; and Toxic Charity*). Bob has a PhD in psychology from the University of Georgia. He serves as a speaker, strategist and inspirer with those who seek God's Shalom in the city.

## COURSE DESCRIPTION

For the 24th annual Siegel Lecture, Dr. Lupton will discuss, “**Toxic Charity — How Churches and Non-Profits Hurt Those They Help and How to Reverse It.**” Dr. Lupton believes that good-intentioned charitable organizations can actually hinder those they try to help. He reminds us that being materialistically poor does not mean there is no capacity, voice, or dignity within a person. He will provide valuable insight on how best to serve the poor by supporting opportunities for them to give their gifts, skills, knowledge, and wisdom to create their future in a caring community. Rather than looking at those in need as charity cases, we must empower them to become stronger members of the community and advocates for themselves.

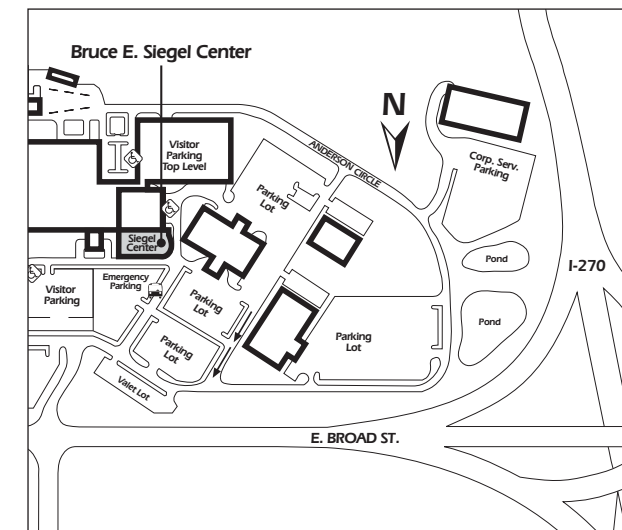
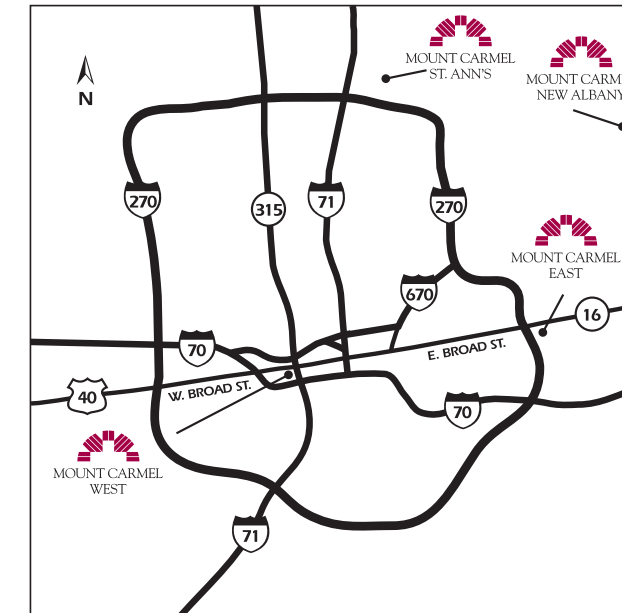
